# THIRD PARLIAMENTARIANS' SUMMIT ON CLIMATE POLICY AND EQUITY IN MIDRAND, SOUTH AFRICA

Parliamentarians hailing from across Africa convened in Midrand, South Africa, from May 15th to 16th, 2023, for the third parliamentarians' summit on climate policy and equity. Hosted jointly by the Pan African Parliament and Pan African Climate Justice, the event brought together more than 200 members representing 54 African nations, alongside voices from civil society organizations, academia, and youth groups. Dr. Mithika Mwenda, Executive Director of Pan African Climate Justice, stressed the urgency of justice in addressing Africa's vulnerability to climate change impacts. President Ho. Chief Fortune Chirumbira of the Pan African Parliament urged practical action and robust leadership to fulfill commitments, while HE William Ruto emphasized potential to drive climate Africa's solutions, transitioning problems from innovation, to particularly in renewable energy. This summit marks a significant stride toward a sustainable future, demonstrating Africa's determination effect transformative changes in climate policy.

The delay in rich countries fulfilling their \$100 billion annual climate finance commitment is jeopardizing global climate negotiations and impeding effective climate action. Oxfam's 'Climate Finance Shadow Report 2023' reveals that despite reported claims of mobilizing \$83.3 billion in 2020, the actual value of support provided was at most \$24.5 billion. Worse still, much of the support is in the form of loans, exacerbating debt burdens for already vulnerable countries. This financial approach not only hampers local communities but also undermines climate negotiations. Gender-blind funding is another concern, with only 2.9% prioritizing gender equality. Oxfam emphasizes the need for increased, grantadaptation based financing for climate mitigation, while highlighting the urgency of addressing loss and damage. As ongoing discussions shape new climate finance goals, the report underscores the imperative to rectify past errors for meaningful progress.

From May 19th to 21st, 2023, Natural Justice (NJ), the Network of Parliamentarians for the Environment in Senegal (REPES), and the Laboratory of Studies and Research in Environmental and Health Policies and Law (LERPDES) jointly organized a knowledge-sharing workshop on the draft environmental code with parliamentary members. Over the course of three days, this workshop aimed to foster dialogue and exchange between representatives and parliamentarians, shedding light on the significance and content of the impending environmental code prior to its parliamentary review and vote. This event also facilitated an in-depth comprehension of national and global environmental concerns among the deputies, allowing for a comprehensive analysis of the implications of adopting the new code. Notably, the workshop gathered valuable recommendations that were subsequently communicated to both the government and parliamentarians, thereby contributing to the groundwork for the forthcoming review of the legislation in committee and plenary sessions.

# BONN REFLECTION BRIDGING THE CLIMATE FINANCE GAP BY DR.MITHIKA MWENDA EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF PACJA

Mithika Mwenda, the Executive Director of the Pan African Climate Justice Alliance (PACJA), recently highlighted the urgent need for adequate climate financing during the Bonn Climate Change Conference 2023. Reflecting on his experience at the conference, Mithika shared his demands and vision for a fair and sustainable future.

"First, we have to understand what closing climate finance gap means. There is a difference between what is in the papers and what is supposed to be delivered," Mithika emphasized. The climate financing commitments made by wealthier nations, as mandated by the Paris Agreement and the climate convention, have not been fulfilled as required. Mithika stressed that the scale of resources needed to repair the damage caused by climate change is massive.

"On the scale of what is being delivered on the controversial 100 million USD per year, the reality on the ground is completely different," Mithika revealed. While reports claim that nearly \$100 million per year has been provided for climate financing, Mithika challenges this assertion. The funds are seemingly invisible, leaving the countries that need them the most questioning where the money has gone.

"In terms of closing the climate finance gap, we need to match the challenge with the resources," Mithika asserted passionately. Climate justice imperative demands that those responsible for the climate crisis must provide the necessary resources for adaptation and resilience building. He highlighted the pressing need for Africa and other vulnerable countries to receive the support they deserve.

"When it comes to adaptation, there is a complete imbalance between what is provided for the nations and the adaptation," Mithika stated. The interests of donors and industrialized nations often prioritize mitigation projects, where profitability is a driving factor. Mithika stressed that adaptation, which is vital for Africa and frontline communities, must not be neglected.

"Polluters must pay for their emissions and reduce them in line with scientific recommendations.," Mithika asserted. "Climate finance should be newly funded, accessible and must respect the plight of the people," he emphasized. Current funding mechanisms often prioritize investments rather than fulfilling the principles of climate justice.

"The Dutch government should use their influence to support African positions," Mithika requested. Recognizing the progressive nature of the Netherlands, he urged the Dutch government and public to champion African interests on finance, adaptation, resilience building, and emission reduction. He also appealed for the Netherlands to fulfill its fair share of climate finance, acknowledging the suffering caused by its actions.

Mithika's demand for climate justice and adequate climate financing serves as a wake-up call to the world. The urgency to bridge the climate finance gap and support vulnerable nations, especially in Africa, cannot be ignored. It is time for wealthier nations to fulfill their obligations, prioritize adaptation, and uphold the principle of polluters paying for their actions. Together, we can build a more just and sustainable future for all.
